Ms. Jasmine Shriver, are presentative of the Citizens Advisory Committee for SpecialEducation, sharedherreasonsfordisaggregatingspecialeducationdata.MSPAPperformance results indicate a substantial increase in the performance gap over time between regular and specialeducationstudentsacrossthegrades.Ms.Shriverstatedthatregularedu cationand rd grade, starttodeclinein 5 th grade, and plummet in specialeducationscoresarecomparablein3 8thgrade.ShefurtherstatedthatinBaltimoreCounty,andinmostjurisdictions,thelargest th disabilitycategory, K -5, isspeechlanguage impa irment. This category is rarely used after 5 grade. Specialed ucation students with speech language impairment are given IEP's, even if they onlyreceivespeechtherapyservices. Thescores are counted into the special education MSPAP scores. Theses tudents are usually the highest achieving and highest performing special educationstudents, and their scores can help inflate and explain the comparable performance resultsseenonMSPAPbetweenregularandspecialeducationstudentsingrade3. These studentsexitspecialeducationaftergrade5becausetheynolongerneedspeechtherapy,andthis could explain the dramatic climbin special education MSPAPs coresing rade 8.

TheworksessionwascalledtoorderbyPresidentDonaldL.Arnoldat7:03p.m.In additiontoPresidentArnold,thefollowingBoardmembers werepresent:Ms.SarahD.Bormel, Ms.PhyllisE.Ettinger,Mr.ThomasG.Grzymski,Mr.MichaelP.Kennedy,Ms.JaneseMurray, Mr.JamesR.Sasiadek,andMr.JamesE.Walker.Alsopresentweremembersofstaffandthe media.

Mr.Arnoldwelcomedeveryon eandthankedMs.RitaFromm,ExecutiveDirectorof PlanningandSupportOperations,Mr.DanielScroggs,AdministrativeSupport -Technology,and Mr.GregBarlow,ExecutiveDirectorofTechnology,fortheirhardworkinpreparingfor tonight'svideopresenta tion.Mr.ArnoldintroducedMs.Fromm.

Mr. TeplitzkyandMr. Haydenenteredtheroomat 7:05p.m.

Ms.FrommintroducedMs.CarolynStaskiewicz,ProjectManagerwithDeJongand Associates,andMr.MatthewCropper,GISAnalystwithDeJongandAssociates .Ms. StaskiewiczandMr.Croppermadeavideopresentationthatsuppliedinformationaboutthe DeJongfirm,thetimeline,andtheprocessusedinthestudy.

It was noted that the student population in the Northwest Area is expected to increase by about 1,300 by 2010. There are 7,098 single -family detached homes planned for development in this area. That could generate up to 4,258 students. Ms. Staskiewicz stated there were 394 births in 2001 within the New Town Elementary School boundary, which would mean the rewould be twice a smany kinder garteners in 2006 as the rearecurrently.

Inlookingatboundaryadjustments,theonewherestudentsweremovedtheleastand causedminimumamountofchangeresultedinnolessthaneight(8)elementaryschoolsb eing affectedand500studentsthatwouldbemoved.DeJongrecommendedtheBoardconsider buildinganelementaryschool,perhapsontheWoodholmesite.

Short-termoptions(1 -2years)torelieveNewTown'sovercrowdinginclude:

- Annexingapproximately 150NewTownElementarystudentstoFranklinand GlyndonElementarySchools,
- Useofportable classrooms,
- Doubleshifts/splitsessions,
- Yearroundschool, and
- Theuseofalternativespacesi.e., classes at community centers.

Itwasnotedthattheaboveare options, butthey are not being recommended.

Long-termrecommendationsinclude:

- Construction of an ewelementary school and consideration of building as econdelementary school,
- · Conductingadistrict -wideboundary analysis, and
- Developingadistrict -widefacilityplan.

Mr.Cropperreviewedtwopossibleboundaryadjustmentoptions. The first involved three pockets of students. Some students from New Townwould be shifted to Winand, which would place Winand overcap acity, therefore, creating a domino effect. Some students would be sent from Winand to Church Lane, and some students from Church Lane would be transferred to Randallstown. A second pocket of young sters would be transferred to Fort Garrison and a few Fort Garrison students would be transferred to Pinewood. The third pocket of students would be transferred to Owings Mills.

The second option would involve shifting boundaries at all 18 Northwest Areas chools.

WithregardtoSpecialTransferstudentsand option#2,Ms.Staskiewicznotedthatthere arestillnotenoughseatsifeveryonewenttotheirhomeschool.

Mr.GrzymskiaskedMs.Staskiewiczifanyconsiderationwasgiventostudentsin housingunitsinareasthatmaybepronetohighturnover,such asstarterhomesorapartments. Ms.Staskiewiczstatedthatinformationwasnotconsideredinthisevening'spresentation,but thatitdidfigureintotheenrollmentprojectionsdonebytheschoolsystem.Ms.Carter, SpecialistinBoundaries/EnrollmentpotedthattheOfficeofStrategicPlanninghasmappedall apartmentcomplexesintheNorthwest,Southwest,andSoutheastAreas.Shealsostatedthat thereissizablehousingplannedintheReisterstownRoadcorridor,theLibertyRoadcorridor, andtheN ewTownareathathasnotbeenmappedbecausepermitshavenotbeenissued.

Ms.Ettingerinquiredastohowmanystudentsoverthestateratedcapacityareinthe NorthwestArea.Ms.StaskiewiczstatedthatbasedonBaltimoreCountyPublicSchools' projections,theschoolsystemisnotyetovercapacity,butwillbeovercapacitywithinthenext year.ShealsostatedthereareonlytwoNorthwestschoolsthatarenotovercapacity,which providesroomforabout150students.Through2010,therearepro jectedtobe11,320students inNorthwestAreaelementaryschools.

Mr. Teplitzkystatedthis informationne edstobe presented to the State and County funding authorities, since they must approve new construction. He noted that construction of a new building, from planning and design to occupancy, can take 5 -6 years.

Mr. Hay den expressed the need to educate parents of the possible moves and of the necessity to address this before the next school year.

Mr. Arnoldstatedthatwhenyouincludetheramifica tionsofthe *NoChildLeftBehind Act* and housing, it becomes more important to speak with elected official stoad dress this problem.

Mr. TeplitzkysharedhisanticipationofquestionsfromStateandCountyofficials regardingdistrict -wideissuesandstatedwehavetobeabletoshowthatthisisnotjusta NorthwestAreaissue. Hesuggested expanding the studytootherareas of Baltimore County.

Mr. Walkersharedhisconcernoftheoutofcontrolovercrowdingp roblemandnotedthat the construction of an ewschool on the Woodholmesite would not alleviate the problem. Mr. Walker also noted that modular smight be an immediate solution. Ms. From magreed that more seats are needed in the Northwest Area and stated the school system does not have a large site bank.

Mr.Teplitzkyagreedthatmodularadditionsmightbeamoredesirableoption. These buildingshavetheirownfacilities and have a covered or closed -inwalkway to the existing building. Also the cost is considerably less than new construction. Mr. Teplitzky stated that if there is a short -termsolution that involves the least disruption of moving students from one school to another, it should be considered.

Ms.Ettingercautionedagainstcreatingov ersizedelementaryschools.Sheremindedher colleaguesthatwhenlargenumbersofrelocatablesandmodularsareplacedonschoolsites, thereisnoincreaseinthesizeofthelibrary,cafeteria,andothersupportserviceareas.

Mr.Grzymskiinquired aboutotheravailablebuildingsitesintheNorthwestArea.Ms. CarternotedtheRandallRidgesiteinRandallstown,butexplainedthesiteisnotviablefor construction.Mr.Brocato,DataAnalystintheOfficeofStrategicPlanning,statedthatmosto oursitebankpropertieswerepurchasedinthe40's,50's,and60's,wheneducational requirementsforbuildingschoolsweredifferent.Manyofthesitesnolongermeettoday's requirements,andmanyareinprotectedwetlandareas,whereitisnotfeasi bletobuild.
